Children Act Fast... **SO DO POISONS!**National Poison Prevention Week, March 16-22

Parents need to be mindful of their children when using or storing household chemicals and medicines. Many accidental poisonings happen when adults become distracted for a just a few moments and a child gets into something he or she should not. Children act fast, and adults must make sure that household chemicals and medicines are stored away from children at all times.

Who is at risk?

Children under age five are at highest risk for unintentional poisonings. These children are constantly exploring the world around them; and what children see and reach, they usually put in their mouths.

As your child's mobility increases, he or she can reach medicines and household chemicals wherever stored. These products should be locked up where possible, out of the child's reach.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, more than 90 percent of poison exposures occur in the home. Many household products can be poisonous if swallowed or inhaled. The most common poison exposures for children are ingestion of household products such as cosmetics and personal care products, cleaning supplies,

pain relievers, foreign bodies, and plants.


I have no small children in my home, do I still need to be careful?

Yes, because young children may visit your home. A study by the American Association of Poison Control Centers found that 17 percent of the oral prescription drugs that were ingested by children under 5 belonged to a grandparent or great-grandparent.

Help prevent poisonings

- Keep harmful products out of your child's sight and reach.
- Never call medicine "candy."
- Do not take medicine in front of small children.
- Buy medicine and household products in childproof packages.
- Always replace safety caps immediately.
- Never leave alcohol within a child's reach.
- Keep products in their original containers and leave the original labels on all products.
- Teach children not to drink or eat anything unless it is given by an adult.
- Do not put decorative lamps and candles that contain lamp oil where children can reach them because lamp oil is very toxic.
- Check your home for old medications and discard them by flushing them down the toilet.
- Discard substances used for old-fashioned treatments such as oil of wintergreen, boric acid, ammoniated mercury, oil of turpentine, and camphorated oil.



Q. My child is over the age limit but still needs medical coverage. Would coverage still be available?
